Stone Farm

Many of our Year 6 pupils visited Stone Farm in Devon last week, they were so lucky with the weather and had a marvellous time. Thank you so much to the teachers and support staff who accompanied the trip, these experiences are not possible without their volunteering time and energy. What follows are the accounts of two of our Year 6 pupils:

I really enjoyed Stone Farm for lots of different reasons. The most important reason to me, is that I got to spend the whole trip with my friends and we got to do lots of stuff together, like laughing at each other's jokes in our dorm, or naming the animals at the farm. It made my trip extremely enjoyable. Secondly, I enjoyed playing with all the animals, even the chickens! My favourite animals were the rabbits and the pigs. Thirdly, I enjoyed going to different places each day. The first day, we went to a place called Tree Surfers. It was amazing! We went on a massive zip line 70ft in the air! For me, it felt like I was flying through the air. The second day we went for a walk on Dartmoor. We first went to a manmade forest that contained the remains of some old roundhouses, tombs and a line of mysterious rocks. We then went to another part of Dartmoor and it had 3 tors (high hills with rocks at the top). It had a wheelvright and a blacksmith. The third day, we went to the beach! We went rock pooling, we found a few shrimps and a weird wriggly thing. Also we went swimming in the sea and we had fun jumping whenever a big wave came! I had really good time at Stone farm, and it was definitely the BEST residential trip I have ever been on!!

I really enjoyed Stone Farm because we got to bond with everybody even if we didn't know them that well, got to hold many animals and went on many trips. The first trip we went on was to a place called Tree Surfers. Tree Surfers is a parkour place where we got to play and even conquer our fears! We climbed ziplined and many more! The best activity was Jacob's Ladder because we got to work together the most and got to see who got to the highest step. On the second trip we got to go onto the tors. Tors are huge hills with rocks on them. We learnt the process of how people made solid wheels in past centuries and that a flowing body of water carried above the ground is called an aqua duct. One of the myths we were told about the moor is that if you walked over a bridge called The Clapper without clapping you would become ugly. On the last trip we went to a beach. We got to go rock pooling and found many different types of fishes. We also got to swim! During Thursday night we had a disco and everybody was partying. Overall, everybody had a great time and the experience was just amazing. I was so glad I went and wish I could do it again.

Parents/Carers of Year 6 pupils

The deadline for applying to secondary school is Tuesday 31st October. There is plenty of time! Secondary schools will be holding open events during September and October, check the secondary school's website for information about these events. We would always recommend that you attend these, not just for your top choice of school but also for other schools you are considering.

You have an option to apply for up to 4 schools. We would strongly recommend you enter 4 schools on your application. Applying for more schools will not reduce your chances of getting a place at your preferred school. Our home/school link worker, Kate Stratford, is available to help and support parents with their applications if you would find this useful.

Secondary schools are starting to run open evenings. I would urge you to go along to one or two to give you and your child an insight into the school they might be going to next September.
